Dear friends of Bishop Luffa School,

In the year where everything stopped, it was very important to us that the Year Book continued. You might expect the first half of the book to be full of photos and reports and the second half to be empty. That is not the case. Bishop Luffa students showed that life in lockdown was different, but it was still full of creativity, charity and fun. The lockdown section of the Year Book is a testament to the resilience of teenagers and I think puts paid to the talk of this being a 'snowflake' generation. I hope that the book itself becomes a memento of this sad but historic time.

This year also marked the end of an era for Andrewes House. Mr Putnam took over as Head of House in 1995, appointed by the school's second Head Teacher, Mr Ashwin. In July, Mr Putnam stepped down. I can't imagine that there are many Heads of House in the country who have served their school for so long. To put this achievement in perspective, the nearest Head of House in length of service is Mrs Charge, who was appointed in 2013.

Most of all, 2020-21 showed us how much support we have from the school community. Through -out lockdown we received cards, letters and emails that kept us going when things seemed very difficult. We also received many incredible acts of kindness, such as the send-off that the Parents, Carers and Friends Association organised for Year 11 and 13, with less than 24-hours' notice. The reason that this school feels so unique is because of the care and the prayers that we receive from the school family, which reaches well beyond our present students.

Finally, 2020-21 will be remembered as the year when Ms Castle (now Mrs King) raised everyone's spirits with her illustrations of Bible verses and prayers. My personal favourite were these words from St Teresa of Avila:

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


Fantastic A'Level & GCSE Results—and a perfect Ten!

In August 2019 students at Bishop Luffa Sixth Form celebrated a record-breaking set of results, with two-thirds of grades awarded at A*-B. The overall pass rate was 99.5%. A'Level exams have become more challenging, but Joseph Phizackerley, Adam Slater, Chloe Sullivan and Adam Ursell all gained three A*s. Chloe and Adam were happy to get the grades they needed for places at Cambridge and Oxford respectively, while Joseph Phizackerley was off to study Dentistry at Cardiff, and Adam has accepted a place to read Economics at the London School of Economics. A further 11 students achieved A or above in all of their subjects, with almost a third of entries gaining A or above across the whole Sixth Form. The most popular subject at A'Level was Maths, and it was one of the strongest performers, with 10 A*s awarded and over 50% of students getting at least an A grade.

Outstanding GCSE results also greeted pupils in August 2019, with 86% of students achieving grade 4 or above in English and Maths and 62% achieving grade 5 or above. Leila Karim was the school's top performer, achieving a clean sweep of grade 9s in all 10 subjects that she studied. Other notable successes include Mujib Tamam-Mukhtar, who achieved a grade 7 in Maths. Mujib was an unaccompanied refugee from Ethiopia who spent time in the notorious Calais "jungle". When he joined Bishop Luffa School in 2016, Mujib spoke no English. Mr Andrew Jackson, Assistant Head Teacher, said: 'Mujib is an inspiration to all of us. He has endured more hardship in the last sixteen years than most of us will see in our lifetimes. His resilience and his cheerfulness have made him one of the most popular students in his year.'





A warm Bishop Luffa welcome to Year 7

At the beginning of September we welcomed our new Year 7 pupils to Bishop Luffa School, at the same time as welcoming back all our pupils in Years 8 to 13. Year 7 started their day with breakfast, before spending the morning getting to know each other through a range of activities. Positively MAD gave a great session showing Year 7 creative approaches to learning. The day concluded with Spaghetti Towers, a traditional, healthy inter-house competition, the winners being Otter House with a magnificent tower that was 96cm tall! Mr Topley, Assistant Headteacher, Head of Key Stage 3 talked to the pupils about how to live life in all its fullness at Bishop Luffa School.

Air Cadets commemorated the Battle of Arnhem

In September two Bishop Luffa students, Elyot Harmston (13Ridgeway) and Alec Parkin (10Andrewes), travelled with a group of 461 (Chichester) RAF Air Cadets to the Netherlands to take part in an important historic event. The Airborne March is the annual Dutch commemorative event in remembrance of the Battle of Arnhem in September 1944 and is held in memory of the 1750 plus British and Polish soldiers who lost their lives in the battle and who are buried in the War Cemetery at Oosterbeek. 2019 was the 73rd Anniversary of the Airborne March and the 75th anniversary of the Battle for Arnhem. Elyot and Alec were proud to support their squadron and pay respects at the War Cemetery Oosterbeek; they also visited Airborne Museum Oosterbeek and the Dutch National Military Museum at Soesterberg.





Future DJs rocked

Year 8 were treated to a special hands on presentation by *Future DJs* a new initiative to encourage all pupils to engage in hands-on music-making using the music they listen to outside school. This was well received by our students. The visiting DJs commended the behaviour and engagement of our pupils saying that 'Bishop Luffa was the best school they had visited so far'. BEATS visit Bishop Luffa

During the Autumn term students from Wilson House were pleased to welcome Saut Gultom who is part of the BEATS team working in Indonesia supporting children effected by the tsunamis. The school has supported this work through its Christmas Jumper Day charity fundraising. Saut visited the school with Sarah Page, founder of BEATS which is a local charity. Formed after the tsunami in Aceh on Boxing Day 2004

BEATS supports Children's Homes in Medan: YACAN (36 children/students) and YASAH (120 children/students). Many of these children were victims of an earthquake on Nias Island in 2005. YASAH has a school of 430 pupils (Years R – 13) and the money raised by Bishop Luffa children helped to pay teachers' salaries. Recently BEATS has supported victims of the Lombok earthquakes. The pupils from Year 8 talked with Saut and were able to contrast their education with that of the children in Indonesia.





Author Andy Mulligan pays a visit

In October we welcomed author Andy Mulligan to the school as part of the first *Chichester Children's Bookfest*. His book *Trash* is popular as a class read in Year 7 so pupils from across Key Stage 3 were thrilled to meet the author and learn about the origins of the story. He spoke about how chance encounters with real children have inspired his books and they were spellbound by his stories - rarely has a hall full of pupils sat so perfectly still! One Year 11 also came along to meet him and spoke about the impact *Trash* had on her in her first year at Bishop Luffa. Mr Hindman said "Andy inspired our students by showing us the reality of life as a writer and sharing with us where he gets his inspiration from. Students were captivated."

World Scout Jamboree 2019

This year four Bishop Luffa students got the fantastic opportunity to travel to West Virginia for the 24th World Scout Jamboree, the biggest scouting event in the world. We had the absolute time of our lives and have learnt so much in the process, we have made memories and friends for life.





Believe, Achieve and Succeed



They also raised an impressive amount for Ridgeway's House charity.



Bishop Luffa marks Holocaust Memorial Day

On Monday 27th January Bishop Luffa School, along with people and organisations across the World, marked Holocaust Memorial Day. This year had added resonance as it marked the 75th anniversary of the liberation of Auschwitz-Birkenau. Monday was the culmination of over a week of events in School to commemorate this significant moment – remembering the victims of the Holocaust and other, subsequent genocides, such as in Bosnia and Rwanda.

Many pupils and staff added their handprints to a piece of display work to commemorate the Holocaust. A giant flame (the symbol of the day) was created out of handprints –



symbolising the individuality that the Nazis tried to extinguish. This was followed by a week of assemblies where Jemba Valerio and Imi Miller (both Year 12) shared their experience of a recent visit to Auschwitz, largely funded by the Holocaust Educational Trust. These powerful assemblies finished with a prayer to

commemorate victims of the Holocaust.



On Holocaust Memorial Day, tutor time saw tutors share poetry, prayers and clips with their groups which emphasised the importance of the day, and the role that we all have in standing up against injustice and discrimination. The day also saw pupils celebrate their individuality through the wearing of their own shoes. This idea was put forward by Jemba and Imi and was inspired by the images of piles of shoes at Auschwitz, and how they illustrated the Nazis' attempt to destroy the individuality of those who were persecuted. Through fundraising £600 was donated to the Holocaust Educational Trust to help them continue their valuable work.

As Mr Williams said to staff before tutor time, we as a School celebrate 'life in all its fullness' and we mark this day to remember how many people in History have not been fortunate enough to be able to live such a life, facing discrimination and injustice. Our school motto thus helps remind us of the values we share as a community, and why they are so precious.





CyberFirst Girls Competition 2020


The money raised from the lunch, approximately £130 was donated to the Snowdrop Trust.








Virtual Fruition 2020








The Luffa Spring Clean for PICU
