Students celebrate their A-Level & GCSE results

Students at Bishop Luffa School were celebrating the end of two very challenging years at school and looking forward to continuing their studies at school, college and universities across the country.

Head Teacher Austen Hindman said: 'Our Year 13 students were the last to sit national exams. They had one term of Sixth Form before the disruption began. Their response has been inspiring to all of us: they have shown good humour and resilience. They have not let the pandemic throw them off course or dampen their spirits. We are very proud of them all.'

Head of Sixth Form Jamie Saunders confirmed that the majority of Sixth Form students were headed to their first-choice university: 'we have been very focused on getting students onto their next steps and it's been wonderful to see so many achieve places on a range of competitive courses. It has been an honour to guide such a wonderful group of young people through the turbulence of the last two years. All along they have shown such a positive sense of community and had the good will and strength of character to deal with the challenges they have faced in a purposeful way. We wish them all the best on their exciting journeys ahead.'

Year 11 also celebrated their GCSE results. Exams may have been cancelled but there was probably more assessment taking place than ever before. This year group showed that they are able to adapt to a constantly changing world. They have also lifted our spirits during the lockdowns and other restrictions that we have had to endure. We are very proud of them.







A Fantastic Start to the School Year

Lily Wins Royal Opera House Design Lockdown Challenge

Year 11 student Lily Hanna took part in a national design challenge run by the Royal Opera House (ROH) to research, design and present on video a costume or theatre set, completed over a six week period during lockdown. Lily was delighted to find out she had won the junior lockdown category from Director of The Royal Ballet, Kevin O'Hare. Lily was invited to the ROH to attend a stage performance of *The Magic Flute*, backstage tour of departments, and an evening exhibition and awards ceremony of junior, senior, FE and HE college winners.

Kevin O'Hare, Director of The Royal Ballet said, "We chose Lily's costume design for Titania as our overall winner. Lily explained her very detailed design process and supported this with sketches that showed the developing stages of her designs. She explained that her interpretation of the Director's vision focused on nature, as she has learned to notice it more during lockdown. Her final costume was intended to be visually striking on the stage but also practical for the movement qualities of a dancer. Congratulations Lily!"



Bishop Luffa Goes Green

Bishop Luffa hosted its first 'Go Green Week'. The aim of the week was to create a meaningful, memorable and fun week on environmental issues to generate awareness and an opportunity to take action to make a difference. Each day had a different theme: Monday was 'Make small changes' - all staff and students were encouraged to have a plastic and meat free lunchbox and a reusable bottle. Year 7s had a litter picking contest and everyone got to watch a fantastic video clip created by one of our Year 11s about what small changes we can each make to help maintain our biodiversity. Tuesday was Recycling Day - students brought in a range of items to be recycled — from batteries to Covid testing kits. At lunchtime, Year 11s ran a wonderful recycled art project (turning bottles into butterflies). Another group ran an outdoor club for the week, with students from all years getting stuck in and transforming our neglected green areas, but also, learning about the flora and fauna through pond dipping. Wednesday was 'Car Free Day' - an international event held on this day. It saw many staff and students changing their journey to school - instead of driving, choosing to walk, cycle, catch a bus or train. For many this was a new challenge - cycling from West Wittering, North Mundham, Bognor and beyond. Lunchtime was our first ever 'Cycle Powered Karaoke' - which was much enjoyed by all. After school, there was a buzz of creativity as a number of students took part in a two day 'Upcycling workshop', trying out ways to transform old clothes into something new.

Thursday was 'PARKing Day' - eight parking spaces were transformed into a gallery of Chelsea flower show-inspired garden designs created in art from recycled materials, wonderfully decorated with plants generously donated by Hills Plants. These were judged by Sarah Sharpe - our local Green Party Councillor. The week culminated in an upcycle dress up day with students and staff thinking carefully where their clothes come from - choosing to wear second-hand, charity shop bought or upcycled costumes. We did see some fantastic costumes! Lots of fun, lots of great discussions, lots of small actions taken...we hope that many will continue to make these 'green' choices!

Bishop Luffa Awarded Prestigious International School Award

We were delighted to announce that Bishop Luffa School had been awarded the British Council's prestigious International School Award in recognition of our work to bring the world into the classroom. The school earned this accreditation through its inspirational international work and links with schools abroad. The International School Award celebrates the achievements of schools that do exceptional work in international education. Fostering an international dimension in the curriculum is at the heart of the British Council's work with schools, so that young people gain the cultural understanding and skills they need for life and work in today's world. Bishop Luffa's international work includes projects with partner schools in Spain, France, Germany, Sweden, South Korea and Tanzania. The International Links projects vary from penpals, trips abroad, World Culture Week, Eco-Green activities, Language Exchanges to creating Diversity, Equality and LGTBQ+ committees and we ran several projects on these matters this year. We also hosted an International Teacher Training Programme in collaboration with Chichester University.



Scott McDonald, Chief Executive of the British Council, said: 'The school has earned this prestigious award through its inspirational international work and links with schools abroad. The International School Award is a chance for schools to be recognised for their important work bringing the world into their classrooms. This is especially commendable when schools have been deeply affected by the global pandemic. The desire to build on their international work shines through and it is with utmost pride that we celebrate their achievements. By embedding an international dimension in children's education, these schools are preparing their students for successful lives in the UK or further afield, empowering them to be global citizens, and are creating vital opportunities in an increasingly global economy.'

The Award is now available worldwide in countries such as India, Egypt, Lebanon, Nigeria, and Pakistan. Over 6000 International School Awards have been presented to successful schools in the UK since the scheme began in 1999. The International School Award encourages and supports schools to develop:

- An international ethos embedded throughout the school
- A whole school approach to international work
- Collaborative curriculum-based work with a number of partner schools
- Year-round international activity
- Involvement of the wider community

Bishop Luffa Remembers

The whole School community came together in solemn remembrance on Armistice Day, with students and staff gathered on the field for a service of commemoration, including two minutes silence at 11am. As well as prayers and thoughts, the short service included

wreath laying, and the sounding of 'The Last Post' and 'Reveille' performed by Freddie Lynas (100tter).



After a virtual service last year it was humbling and heartening to see the School come together in person to mark this important event. The conduct of the students was superb, within, and either side of the service. In the build-up to the service, tutor groups each morning reflected on the meaning of remembrance, and had the chance to buy poppies. The service ended with Funmi Ajayi (one of our School Captains) dismissing the students by blowing a whistle used in the trenches – the sound

of which gave them a tangible link to those events over a century ago. Along with the Spitfire that flew overhead, and the birdsong that punctuated the two minute silence, it added to the solemnity, and poignancy, of the event.

Students Perform at Dance House

We were so pleased the dancers finally performed this piece, which they created with Miss Inch in December 2020! Their performance was stunning and highlighted their dedication and hard work. All of the dancers rehearsed tirelessly prior to the performance and we were so proud of them all. The organisers were full of praise for our Year 11 dancers, not just for their dance ability, but also for the way they conducted themselves in the theatre.

The Big Walk 2021

At the start of October, in spite of waking up to torrential rain (which, thankfully, made way for lovely sunshine later in the day), the Bishop Luffa Community were set for a day of fundraising and activities surrounding our Wellbeing. The day involved a range of activities which were aimed at raising our awareness of what it takes to thrive at Bishop Luffa. There are six elements of thrive which our wellbeing strategy focusses on:

- ◆ Talking
- ♦ Help
- Rest and recovery
- ♦ Insight
- ♦ Values
- ◆ Exercise

The walk itself – a 10k loop from school to Lavant Green and back – more than covered the Exercise! For some students, this was a real challenge too. We were so proud of everyone for taking part as a school community. As well as our walkers, we had a group of staff and student runners who left ahead of the walking groups to complete the distance a little more rapidly than the rest of us! One student, Harvey McGuinness in 11 Ridgeway, took the challenge to a whole new level and ran the entire 10k loop in one go (and in a very, very impressive 34 minutes!) before changing and then joining his tutor group to complete the walk with them. Being able to make 20k look effortless made for lots of envy from many staff and students alike so well done to Harvey! The most wonderful part of the day was that we had time to spend together as a school to talk and connect. The atmosphere on Lavant Green was just wonderful. Football games, picnics and just time reconnecting with one another after a difficult couple of years with school closures and Lockdowns was something which we all needed – perhaps more than we realised! We were helped on the Green by our

ever-brilliant PFA Patrick from The Ice Box (who was run ragged trying to keep up with demand for ice creams!) who also commented on how delightful our students were and made a generous donation to the fundraising. Activities completed in school involved a range of tasks focussed on gaining an insight from student input as to what a school which thrives would look like. We raised over £18,000; thank you to everyone who donated.

The Wellbeing Strategy has been set up to help us reflect on what we've all experienced over the past couple of years but is also about looking forward. From this, we aim to establish a Wellbeing Trust so that it's not just the mental health and wellbeing of students here with us now that is looked after and supported, but that of students in the future. We know, more than ever, that we are part of a unique and wonderful family here at Bishop Luffa so we want to do all we can to ensure that future year groups—generations even—are able to benefit from the lessons we've learned over the past two years and move forward making sure that we do, always, live life in all its fullness.

Year 9 RE Students Challenged and Inspired....

In November, across three separate virtual presentations, all Year 9 students were able to hear Frederick Naftel present his personal view on 'Antisemitism, past and present'.

Eddie in Year 9 wrote... "I found the speech from Freddy Naftel really interesting because it taught me about how it really was to be a Jew during the Second World War. Hearing from some-



one who has had relatives die and suffer because of their religion really enlightened the class. I think that it was useful because it showed us what it is really like from a different perspective, not reading from an article or video, so the class was more engaged. The class found it interesting and we all really enjoyed it. It showed what a party can do if they are put in power and how bad antisemitism is."

Supporting Chichester Food Bank

Chichester District Food Bank (CDFB) opened in September 2012 with support from seven local churches. They provide emergency food parcels for families and individuals in crisis in the Chichester District of West Sussex. The area they cover includes Chichester city, as well as major rural communities in Selsey, Petworth, Midhurst and surrounding villages. The impact of Covid-19 has affected all areas of our lives and we continue to stand united with those who are struggling at this time.

In the year 2020-2021 the Trussell Trust reported another significant jump of 39% of people claiming an emergency food parcel. As part of our outward Christian ethos we are always looking at how we can enable our students to help those around them live life in all its fullness. Food is a basic need which when not met means life gets very difficult.

As a whole school we came together in November for our third annual Food Bank appeal. It was incredible, yet again, to see so many students bringing in a donation and many donating several items. For example, while they may not weigh much, we had a big bag full of toothbrushes, sanitary items and a crate full of toothpaste! All of these items, along with all the food, went a long way this winter to helping those in need in our district.

The overall total weight we have donated over the past three years now stands at 2,442.1kg! This means that we have helped 223 people have access to an emergency food parcel in the last three years.

Year 8 Science Trip to Winchester Science Centre

Towards the end of the Autumn term, Year 8 students had the opportunity to visit the Science Centre at Winchester. Students shared their thoughts on what they enjoyed about the trip:

The trip was a great success and students learnt about constellations, the planets, about our Sun and what a black hole is - a well-presented show aimed at KS3 student's curriculum content. The Science Centre also had two interactive areas, where students immersed themselves in the exhibits related to STEM topics. One area was specifically for Exploring Space. The other area included science concepts such as Forces, Sound, Environmental issues and the interaction of organisms in various habitats. The exhibits all had a link to future careers in STEM, so students could see where the science they are learning could lead on to. The final session

included a workshop to build their own bottle rocket in teams, ensuring it had the necessary specifications to go fast and win the final race. The rockets were then launched across the room on strings above using fuel (all fired by the Centre staff!). The students all had a fun filled learning experience and they followed this up back in school with poster designs of their rockets.





It was very sad to say goodbye to 11Story – it has been a pleasure to see them grow and develop into the fine young adults they are during their five years at Bishop Luffa.



A Productive Term in the Design Technology Department

Students worked hard this term on some fantastic projects. Year 7 made a safety flashing light, created isomeric drawings, identified electronic components and learnt how to solder. In Year 8 some of our students made a passive amplifier, researched their target market, produced a design brief, modelled a prototype and learnt the theory behind smart materials, modern materials and energy. Others in Year 8 had textiles lessons and made their own designer cushions using patchwork designing and sampling, undertook observational studies in nature, and created explorational sample work using stencilling, couching, batik and tie dye. Making an angle lamp was the task for Year 9 which enabled them to hone their skills by looking at their client's needs and the environmental and social impact before creating their design brief. The students made orthographic drawings and used their CAD/CAM design and manufacturing skills.



GCSE Design and Technology allows students to study core technical and designing and making principles, including a broad range of design processes, materials techniques and equipment. They also have the opportunity to

study specialist technical principles in greater depth. During this last term GCSE students in Year 10 used their theory knowledge and

practical skills to make their own style clock. GCSE Food and Preparation Year 11 students developed knowledge and understanding of food and nutrition, and improved their practical food preparation and cooking skills.

Bookmaster 2022


To celebrate World Book Day, we held our second annual Inter-house Bookmaster competition – a week long festival of book related tasks and challenges, some to be

Record-breaking Rower visits Year 10

In March we were delighted to welcome Sergeant Laura Barrigan from The British Army to the school, when she gave an inspirational talk to our Year 10 students about her fantastic record-breaking row across the Atlantic with ForceAtlantic. Laura is a serving Exercise Rehabilitation Instructor within the Royal Army Physical Training Corps and took part in



the race with Captain Scott Pollock, Warrant Officer Victoria Blackburn and Staff Sergeant Phillip Welch. The team were rowing with a primary aim to highlight the opportunities that exist to everyone in the Army regardless of their gender, social class or their level of sporting ability.

The 3,000 mile race departed in mid-December and took the team across the North Atlantic Ocean in a 8.5m long rowing boat, which was unsupported. This was the ultimate test of physical and mental endurance, with the team rowing in two hour shifts both day and night. Not only did the team complete the challenge but they broke the world record by rowing the Atlantic in 40 days, resoundingly beating the previous record of 42 days. The Year 10 students found the talk both motivating and inspirational, and it made them see that anything is possible if you put your mind to it.



Spanish Visitors



and Ivan were so impressed with the team's forward thinking, enthusiasm, commitment, maturity, and dedication to the GreenPower project that they offered VW sponsorship to guide, advise and assist the team with the outer body design and fitting, along with a full professional spray paint finish to the car.

Exciting Times in Computer Science

This year we had record attendance to the clubs run by Computer Science staff (and Sixth Formers). Many of the clubs are just for fun, but there is a competitive element to many, be it Chess or VEX Robotics or our Girls Code clubs. This year we entered our first team, Will Lynas (13Otter) and Leo Stirzaker (13Ridgeway), into *CyberCenturion*, a national cyber education initiative in the UK and UK overseas territories. The program is designed to excite, educate and motivate students to pursue further education and careers in STEM and cybersecurity, which helps to build a diverse talent pool to supply the UK's workforce needs.



Perse Coding Team Challenge - we entered four teams to compete for the *Braben Cup*. This competition for UK secondary schools pits teams of students in Years 7 to 11 against each other in a timed automated coding challenges across two rounds. This is a fiercely competitive challenge where it was fantastic to see our older more experienced coders supporting our younger students who had little experience of these kind of challenges before they teamed up for practice. Young Coders Competition 2022 - we had a new club where Year 7s and 8s worked on their entries in *Scratch*. This year's theme is *My World*, *Our Planet* and is a national competition for Year 7s and 8s. Earlier in the year Hannah Carr (9Sherborne), Hannah Day (9Ridgeway), Esther Sutton (9Ridgeway) and Richard Popovitch (7Story) won prizes for being winners in the *Scratch Halloween Competition*; Guy Drew (11Otter) found



out he had won a prize for completing the *Cyber Advent Calendar* (a national competition with 24 different cyber Christmas themed challenges); Amelie Cannon (8Ridgeway) gained a prize winning entry to the Climate change competition. These are all national competitions run by DressCode, and our students have done very well! Our Digital Leaders had a great time trying out new technology at the Digital Leaders' Conference hosted by the Stroud School, and then had another fantastic day exploring and learning at the Bett Show in London; they returned to school with lots of creative ideas to share.

This term saw the launch of the Film and Media Department's inaugural Interhouse Short Film competition. The simple brief sent out to students throughout the school was to create a short film in any genre that addressed the theme "Life in all its Fullness". After looking through the entries, two clear joint winners emerged, both very different but equally superb. Oliver Taylor's (9Sherborne) sci-fi adventure expertly deployed temporal and continuity editing with drone shots and tracking shots to tell the story of a dog who jumps into a portal that transports him to other dimensions. Sixth Former's EPQ Ollie the Octopus stars at COP26

We were very excited and proud to announce that Elise Pullen's (13Andrewes) Extended Project Qualification artefact was displayed at COP26 in Glasgow.

In order to combat plastic pollution Elise created an Octopus, later nicknamed Ollie, to raise childrens' awareness of microplastics on West Wittering beach. She has been awarded an A* grade.

Elise said, 'My project asked 'Can I create a sculpture that raises awareness about marine plastic pollution on West Wittering beach?' with particular reference to 'nurdles', lentil-sized microplastics that are melted down at sea to form almost all

plastic products, but resulting in 200,000 tons spilled annually. Using litter collected from several beach cleans I made a life-size sculpture of an octopus. During my research, I contacted 'The Great Nurdle Hunt', a charity run by 'Fidra' to reduce nurdle pollution through beach cleans or 'hunts', to cite some of their facts and statistics. I ended up sending the sculpture to them in Scotland to use in festivals, and a few days ago they sent an email saying their representatives took him to COP26! They said everyone loved him and they chatted to some interested individuals and international delegates.'

For the competition, we

real cases in which we all took on roles of barristers, witnesses and court staff to argue them as best as we could in court. We were also joined for the day by Callum Munday, a former Luffa student and Bar Mock team member who is now a practicing barrister.



Throughout the day two cases were argued by our barristers in front of Judges and Magistrates from the local area: one of actual bodily harm and another of witness intimidation. After three rounds representing either the prosecution or the defence against the other schools competing, it was announced that we were one of the top two schools and had progressed to the final round of the day. The final round tried the case of R v Piper, actual bodily harm allegedly committed in a cocktail bar. Despite a tense trial, both teams seemingly equally good and the jury unable to reach a verdict, it was announced that Bishop Luffa were the winners. Competing taught us all valuable life skills such as public speaking, critical thinking and how the

justice system operates. For those of us taking Law A-level, it was useful for us to apply our textbook knowledge to a practical situation. Many of the team are considering careers in Law, with the competition giving us insight to what a job in the legal system would consist of.

A timely talk for Year 12 Economists!

In July Year 12 Economists were fortunate enough to hear from Duncan Mackinnon, a senior figure within the Bank of England, who took time out of his busy schedule to visit the School, and speak to them about a whole range of issues. After catching their attention with a photo of the Bank's gold vaults, he



spent the next 45 minutes discussing issues such as the role of the Bank (such as aiming to control inflation), and financial predictions (including thoughts on economic growth, and inflation). Duncan's work especially involves bank regulation, so he was able to explain the vital need for such oversight, especially in the context of the 2008 financial crisis. Within these uncertain economic times, such a talk was incredibly timely, and as well as being highly informative in its own right, it also had great relevance to the work done in A'Level Economics. Once his talk was completed, Duncan took questions from the students on issues such as Quantitative Easing, the reasons for gold storage, and whether, in hindsight, the Bank could have acted differently to try and limit the rises in inflation now being seen. We are very grateful to Duncan for taking the time to visit us. The students were extremely positive about the visit, and I am sure it may inspire a few of them to consider a career in finance!






