Bishop Luffa students had an incredible year – they raised almost £50, 000 for charity, learnt some Ukrainian, produced a number of stunning music and drama performances, won a debating conversation and played MCC at cricket – oh, and they produced a sparkling set of GCSE results to cap it all off!


Overall, 84% students passed both English and Maths, with an average grade of 5.6 for the whole year

group. 62% students achieved grade 5 or higher in English and Maths. There were some outstanding individual results, including:

- Iona Hamilton, who got grade 9s in all of her GCSEs, and is now studying at the International College in Costa Rica
- Euan Campbell, who also got 9 GCSEs at grade 9, and is staying at Bishop Luffa Sixth Form to study Maths, Further Maths and Computer Science.
- Lucy Campbell (no relation to Euan!) who made it three students with a full set of 9s. Lucy is also staying at Bishop Luffa Sixth Form and will be studying Chemistry, Biology and Maths.

Head Teacher Austen Hindman said: "we are so proud of this year group. There are so many incredible achieve-

ments in this set of results. Many students struggled with lockdown and have



First World War Battlefields History Trip

On Friday 14th October, 64 students and seven staff departed on a History visit to the First World War Battlefields of Belgium and France. We headed to Ypres, and started at Essex Farm, visiting the grave of a 15 year old who volunteered at 14 – an immediate introduction to the tragedy of war. We then visited Tyne Cot cemetery, the site of nearly 12,000 British & Commonwealth burials, the majority unnamed. Sophie Williams (9Otter) laid a wreath on behalf of the School, and a moment's



reflection, and reading of 'In Flanders Fields' marked the solemnity of the occasion. Then it was a visit to Langemark German Cemetery, where a mass grave of approx. 24000 troops was shocking statistic to consider. After a meal at a local restaurant, we attended the Last Post service at the Menin Gate, where Mr Jackson and two students laid another wreath on behalf of the School.

The next morning saw a day on the French battlefields, after a visit to Hill 62. Here the museum was fascinating, and the preserved trenches a quite exceptional way to picture, as far as we could, the horrors of trench life. (The tunnels being especially claustrophobic). We then proceeded to Lochnagar Crater, a huge hole created on the 1st day of the Battle of the Somme in 1916. Then it was on to Beaumont Hamel, and the Newfoundland Memorial. The surviving trenches really highlighted the dangers faced by the troops, and signs warning of unexploded ordnance emphasised the impact of war, even today. We then visited the immense memorial at Thiepval, and an overwhelming list of names of those with no known grave. On our return journey to Ypres we visited two smaller cemeteries to mark individuals that myself, and then Alyce Turnbull (9Sherborne) wished to commemorate. These moments helped emphasise the personal loss associated with war.



Sunday morning saw a visit to Lijssenthoek, where Sam Holben (9Andrewes) laid a wreath at the grave of his Great Great Grandad. The story of his family's experience of war was one of real tragedy, and the wreath laying was a moment of great solemnity. Also in the cemetery was the grave of a nurse killed in war, which many sought out. After this sombre visit, it was off to the Tunnel via a French hypermarket.

It was a tired group that returned to School on Sunday evening, but I know that they had the chance to see some important sites, and also have a good time with their friends. After so many missed opportunities due to lockdown, I am sure that this visit had extra significance.

The students were a credit to the School, well-behaved, thoughtful, mature, and on time when given timings to meet! They showed that the future of commemoration is in safe hands, and when we study the First World War, it won't just be photos in a book, but real people, and real places.

Bishop Luffa marks Armistice Day



At 11am on the 11th November, Bishop Luffa School fell silent to mark the Armistice. The whole School came together to remember those who served, and all of those affected by the horrors of war, an event with extra poignancy this year due to events in Ukraine, and the presence in our School community of Ukrainian students and staff. A short, formal service of commemoration brought the School together in prayer and reflection, with readings by the Head, Mr Bonney, Mrs Bradberry, our School Captains (Alex Webb & Amy Joyce), and Reverend Paul Collins. A wreath laying ceremony and the Last Post (ably played by Mr Goldsmith) preceded the customary two minutes silence. An honour guard of students wearing the uniforms of different organisations they are part of, helped

illustrate the solemnity of the occasion. To mark the end of the service, Alex Webb blew a whistle used in the trenches, to provide a tangible link to those who fought all that time ago. With recent conflicts in Iraq and Afghanistan, the conflict in Ukraine, and other conflicts around the World, it is clear that such events are as timely as always, as well as providing an enduring link to the horrific events of times past. The students were exemplary in their behaviour, and show a clear understanding of why such events, and remembrance more generally, matter to the School, and the country at large.

- ♦ Year 7 Product Design made a USB lighting prototype using resistant materials and an electronic kit.
- ♦ Year 8 Product Design designed and made a stylish clock using resistant materials and a clock mechanism.
- ♦ Year 9 Product Design designed and made a stylish angle pose lamp clock using resistant materials.
- ♦ Year 10 Product Design designed and made a stylish Chocolate Box, learning the properties of paper and card in a graphical way, whilst making moulds using resistant materials.
- ♦ Year 7 Textiles made a doll whilst learning new found skills within the Textiles studios.
- ♦ Year 8 Textiles made a cushion cover whilst developing their skills in tie-dye, stencilling and patch work.
- ♦ Year 9 Textiles made a bag linked to a researched study of a culture.

The RE Department has successfully achieved the Gold RE Quality Mark. The RE Quality Mark has two purposes: it recognises high quality RE, particularly those schools which are providing their learners with authentic experiences and contributing to



whole school outcomes, and in addition, it provides a powerful tool for development. As part of the process the quality of teaching and learning, curriculum and leadership are assessed.

The assessor noted in their report that: 'RE is well integrated into the whole school curriculum and there are some interesting cross curricula links and trips. Gaining knowledge of religions is important in the school and learners progress well as assessment is a particular strength. KS5 provision should be especially applauded. RE at the school contributes to the development of English citizens.'

As a team, we are delighted to have received this award and are grateful for the continued hard work and enthusiasm of the wonderful students we teach.

Autumn Term Charity Events

There were lots of charity events taking place during the Autumn term. Burrows House held a Bake Sale raising £83.88 for their House charity. The event was organised by Burrows captains and led by Year 9 and 10 students.

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Oxford University Maths Trip "It All Adds Up!"

In January twelve of our Year 10 and Year 11 students visited the Mathematical Institute at Oxford University, a day designed to inspire young women to pursue Mathematics beyond GCSE. The day started with a presentation from Professor Julia Gog, who was one of the Mathematicians supporting the government through the COVID pandemic. She explained about how they used mathematics to make sense of the strategies available during the pandemic, and why strategies may have differed for different populations.

We then broke off into small classrooms, where we were able to try lots of different mathematical challenges. We loved that the café at the Mathematical Institute was called 'Café Pi' but were disappointed that they hadn't taken the opportunity to price their sandwiches at £3.14! In the afternoon, we tried our hand at origami, learning about how the Ancient Greeks had also considered the same problems, before considering the more modern applications.



To finish, we heard from Rachel Beddoes, who showed us all the incredible careers that involved Maths. We became forensic Scientists, using equations to calculate a time of death for a murder, and then video game designers, looking into all of the graphical equations that make up the shapes required to build a video game. Hearing from students that are currently taking Mathematics at Oxford University was also really interesting. They didn't shy away from how challenging the course was, but also spoke highly of the support and experiences they had been given. An amazing and inspirational day!

Ofsted 'Outstanding'

Bishop Luffa School FINALLY had an OFSTED Inspection – and it's Outstanding!

OFSTED inspectors visited Bishop Luffa School in Chichester in December and have graded the school 'Outstanding'. The school was last inspected in 2008, when it was also given an 'Outstanding' judgement.

Head Teacher Austen Hindman said: 'it is important for our community that we have a report that reflects the school as it is now. We are very pleased that the inspection team saw how inclusive we are and that we are living out our school



motto: "always our best because everyone matters". The inspection report says that "this is a school where you can be yourself and have your individual gifts and talents celebrated."



Mr Hindman said: 'The report also talks about "the school's strong Christian values". Entry to Bishop Luffa School is based on church attendance: you don't need to buy a house on a certain road or pass an exam to get in. Churches are open to everyone and close to everyone.'

OFSTED also praised the impact of the Sixth Form on the ethos of the school: "The school buzzes with activity at lunchtimes as pupils enjoy social time together and participate in the vast array of clubs and societies. Many of these are organised by sixth-form students, who play a remarkably important role in the school. Beyond their academic studies, sixth formers lead other pupils in the excellent contribution the school makes to charities and the local community."

Head of Sixth Form, Jamie Saunders, said: 'Bishop Luffa Sixth Formers are leaders within the school. This responsibility helps our students to grow in confidence and is one of the main reasons why they go on to study at top universities and pursue rewarding careers.'

Bishop Luffa marks Holocaust Memorial Day

Year 10 Work Experience

At the beginning of February 2023, Year 10 students were given the opportunity to take part in a week-long work experience placement, developing employability skills and finding out about the world of work. This is a really exciting and valuable part of the students' careers education throughout their time at Bishop Luffa, which is remembered long after the event.



Students were encouraged to organise their work experience placements themselves by contacting employers and exploring the Education Business Partnership work experience database for contacts. They then wrote emails, made phone calls, sent CVs, and attended work placement interviews as needed. Students had lots of ideas of companies to contact and worked hard to secure their placements.




Placements were successfully organised in a whole range of industries, with some students taking the opportunity to carry out their placement away from home. Students arranged placements in universities, stables, charities, vets, architects, law firms, museums, schools, florists, hospitals, IT departments, engineering companies, hotels, garages, estate agents, retail, hairdressers, farms and sailing clubs amongst others. Highlights identified by students during their placements included talking on the radio, cleaning a plane, working different hours, meeting like-minded people, site visits, learning from others, a trip to London, looking after animals, helping children learn, meeting new people, learning how to make coffee, and attending meetings and conferences.



Feedback from employers shows how impressed they are with our students with many commenting on what a credit they are to the school and themselves. Comments such as 'was absolutely amazing', 'used her initiative', 'impressed with his professional manner', 'saw her confidence grow', 'helpful and mature', 'boundless energy and enthusiasm', 'a natural problem solver', were made by employers, with some students being offered part time jobs and further work experience opportunities.



Billy Elliot: The Musical—What an Amazing Show

The show is a coming-of-age stage musical based on the 2000 film of the same name, with the music by Elton John, and the book and lyrics by Lee Hall, who wrote the film's screenplay.

The story of his personal struggle and fulfilment was balanced against a counter-story of family and community strife caused by the 1984–85 UK miners' strike in County Durham, in North East England. Hall's screenplay was inspired in part by A. J. Cronin's 1935 novel about a miners' strike, The Stars Look Down, to which



the musical's opening song pays homage. This amateur production was presented by arrangement with Musical Theatre International. All authorised performance materials were also supplied by MTI.

The actors and musicians were ably assisted by a great tech team, and lots of behind the scenes assistance including wardrobe, set construction and props. A Grand Tour

A very cold 02:45 on the morning of Friday 10th February saw 38 students of Latin and Classics waiting for a coach in the car park of Chichester Festival Theatre. The early start however, meant a full day of "ruin viewin" in Rome. A coach ride took us past the ancient and modern worlds living side by side: the modern hospital standing on the ancient foundations of the Roman temple to Aesculapius, god of healing; the bridge built before the days of Julius Caesar juxtaposed with Florentine and Rococo architecture; and the modern roads next to the Appian Way where so many slaves had been crucified after the revolt of Spartacus. In brilliant warm sunshine, we saw the sights of the Piazza di Spagna, the Trevi fountain and the breath-taking Pantheon. The bedtime story was the beginning of Book 1 of Homer's Iliad.



After a frighteningly calorific breakfast on the second day we set off to see the Colosseum, Forum and Palatine Hill; awed by the horror of a place whose 100 days of inaugural games, it is said, wiped out the North African lion and killed countless gladiators and criminals, and martyred so many Christians; and exhilarated to walk where so many who shaped the story of Western history had passed before us. After our transfer coach journey to Naples, through the shifting geography of Italy (which brought enormous joy to Mrs Pegg) we arrived at the extraordinary Hotel di Capodimonte perched on a precipitous hill looking out over an extraordinary church and the city of Naples. In

the evening two teams from across the year groups competed in a quiz run by the Year 13s.

Our third day was taken up visiting the house at Oplontis, believed to be owned by the emperor Nero's wife, Poppaea with its dazzling murals of beautiful wildlife and fantastical theatrical architectural scenes. Boscoreale next showed us the more rustic world of a Roman vintner, with his great stone jars of petrified wine. After this we popped to a supermarket where we received from our coach driver a lesson in how to drive a coach to the millimetre with consummate professionalism. The afternoon took us to the glorious Naples Archaeological Museum where we roved and explored, taking great delight in discovering familiar sights from the Cambridge Latin Course and exploring some of the sheer beauty preserved from Pompeii and Herculaneum. That night we read the letters Pliny the Younger, an eyewitness of the eruption of Vesuvius wrote to the historian Tacitus.



Day 4 took us up Vesuvius. It is difficult to say who was happier – Ms Barnett in the Classical joys of Rome or Mrs Pegg with the geographical and topological excitements of Mount Vesuvius. The students were magnificent climbing to the top without complaint and with the weather set fair for us, enjoying looking all across the bay of Naples and the surrounding area. Some adroit manoeuvring by our extraordinary guide got us all delicious, freshly made margarita pizzas at a tiny café just next to Herculaneum Archaeological Park at a significantly reduced price. The afternoon was spent being guided round Herculaneum.

Day 5 was a six-hour tour of Pompeii where we saw the Amphitheatre; Palaestra; many houses of rich and superrich; the extraordinary, and just opened House of the Vetii; the forum baths; the theatre; and of course, compulsorily, the house of Caecilius (of the Cambridge Latin Course) and so much more. Very late in the evening, we returned 38 exhausted students to their families with memories to last a lifetime.

A Fantastic Spanish Exchange

One thing that was missing at Bishop Luffa until now was a host family exchange with our partner school from Spain!

It was wonderful to have our Spanish friends with us for a whole week and share great memories with them. The photos speak for themselves - the enthusiasm was in the air and the experience also taught our students a little bit more about other cultures. Our students really enjoyed showing their Spanish friends their school, their hometown and surroundings, and our beautiful beaches. They say this experience has also made them bond as a group. Our visitors also had a wonderful experience and wanted to share with us a few comments to thank the school and the host

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Iceland 2023



Bishop Luffa Geographers were treated to an action packed trip to Iceland exploring the Golden Circle and beyond over the Easter holidays. From the moment the plane landed we enjoyed a packed itinerary starting with a journey across lava fields to visit the dramatic coastline of Reykjanes peninsula, an introduction to mud pools and steam vents at Gunnhuver before witnessing the fissure between the Eurasian and North American tectonic plates at the Bridge Between the Continents.

On Day 2 we enjoyed a hike through Thingvellir National Park with views of the many rifts and volcanoes followed by a walk up through the bubbling mud and hissing springs of Hveragerdi and onto the most voluminous waterfall in Iceland of Uridafoss, ending the day with a swim at the local geothermally heated outdoor swimming pool (with ice bath, hot tubs and slides to boot!). Day 3 was a day of sea, fire and ice... we witnessed the dramatic glacial retreat at Solheimajokull, the black sands of Vik and had lots of fun scrambling up the basalt columns for photo shoots! The afternoon was spent hiking to the top of Skogafoss and then heading inside a gorge to feel the full force of the cascading water at Glujjfrabui.

Day 4 started with a visit to Geysir to see the giant spouting hot springs erupting every 10 minutes, followed by a walk to Gullfoss - the most photographed waterfall in Iceland. An afternoon was enjoyed floating and relaxing in the sunshine at The Secret Lagoon - Iceland's oldest geothermal pool. Then off again, to hike around the top rim of Kerid Crater and for some around the crater lake too! The day ended with a 10pm hike up the hill to witness the stars in the dark skies and to our amazement a half hour display of the northern lights!





Our final day involved a stunning walk along the moonscape of bubbling mud pools and columns of steam of Seltun hot springs with their memorable aroma! It ended with a hike up to the very top of Fagradalsfjall lava flow (which erupted in August 2021), descending with pockets ladened with shiny 'souvenirs' and happy memories! Here's what some of our students thought of their time away: "Iceland was a real blast with lots of places to visit. Iceland's natural scenery is stunning and lots of geography learnt in school made sense with the places we visited. It has also helped me with my GCSEs as it

has given a real perspective of what tectonic plates can do. PE trip to the 'Home of Cricket'

A group of budding cricketers went to visit the Marylebone Cricket Club (MCC) at the Lord's Cricket Ground in London and were left astounded.

Bishop Luffa is one of very few state secondary schools in the country to host an annual cricket match against the MCC which was the first cricket





club formed back in 1787 and to this day are the custodians of the laws of cricket.

On the trip we learnt about the history of the MCC. Our students challenged the decisions that had been made by the MCC to our historian leader, John, and the club's very slow movement towards equality. We learnt that of the near 19,000 members only 890 were female, and there has only been one female president in the 234 year history. Kumar Sangakkara has been the only black president and it is only since 1999 that ladies were allowed in the famous pavilion, which holds the greatest amount of cricketing artwork in the world at over 3,000 pieces. We were all shocked at the inequality within cricket and the MCC and to this point there has still not been a female test match at Lord's.

We were left inspired by the history of the club, the famous traditions, triumphs of men and women's world cup wins, as well as famous failures and scandals. The day was finished with a masterclass coaching session led by an MCC coach and use of the outstanding facilities where students' confidence grew as they struck the ball with greater venom. This trip has not only demonstrated that cricket is a great game but that we all must play our part in striving for equality within the game. In years to come many of the students on this trip will represent Bishop Luffa in its prestigious match against the MCC and they have developed an understanding of the magnitude of what they have been involved in. A special mention to Jeremy Goode, who helped make this trip possible for all students and continues to significantly support cricket at Bishop Luffa for which we are most grateful.

Bletchley Park and the National Museum of Computing

Twenty-four Computer Science students from Years 10, 11 and 12 visited Bletchley Park and the National Museum of Computing. They spent their time at Bletchley Park discovering the incredible achievements of Britain's World War Two Codebreakers in the place where it happened. The students had a fascinating session learning some of the secrets of the Lorenz machine (more effective but less well known than the iconic Enigma machine), including its use of binary operations to generate a number of key settings that dwarfed that of Enigma.





At the National Museum of Computing they were given a captivating tour that followed the development of computing: from the Turing-Welchman Bombe and Colossus of the 1940s, through the large systems and mainframes of the 1950s, 60s and 70s, to the advancement of personal computing and the rise of mobile computing and the internet. They finished off their day using virtual reality, stepping into another world with their Oculus Headsets; building communication skills by collaboratively solving fast-paced problems. A massive thank you has to go out to the Bishop Luffa Parents' & Friends' Association who put together this event for our students every year and give up so much of their own time.








Rumboldswhyke have fun in Art!

Students secure excellent A'Level results

Students at Bishop Luffa School showed incredible resilience to secure excellent A-Level results. 40% of grades achieved were A*-A, 69% were A*-B and 91% were A*-C. 75% students will be attending their first choice university, despite this being a difficult year for university admissions.



Head Teacher Austen Hindman said: 'this group of students were taking national exams for the first time. They've been through lock-downs and online learning, and many of them had Covid while taking their exams. In spite of this they achieved an amazing set of results. We are incredibly proud of them.

'These students have been leaders throughout the last two years, helping younger students cope with the pressure of Covid and showing us all how important community is. They are a year group that we will never forget.'

There were many individual successes, with 32 students achieving straight As or A*. Caleb Cossar, Ollie Dixon, Beatrice Harmston, Chris Lowes, George Murphy, and Alice Rubli all achieved 3 A* grades, Angus Matthews achieving a fantastic 4 A*grades and Will Lynas an amazing 5 A* grades during his time at Bishop Luffa!

Bishop Luffa students will be studying many different subjects at universities across the country, including creative arts, marketing, humanities, science and mathematics.

Five Bishop Luffa students will be studying at either Oxford or Cambridge next year: Amenie Groves to read Modern & Medieval Languages at Cambridge; Alice Rubli reading French & Portuguese at Oxford; Rachel Turner to read History at Oxford, George Murphy reading Economics at Cambridge, and Leila Karim (who achieved 4 A*s in last year's A'levels) will be reading Engineering at Cambridge.

We also have five students off to study medicine, veterinary science and dentistry. Our medics are Amelia Bromell at Exeter, and Tabitha Sullivan and Maisie Tate at Birmingham. Jodie Moore will study veterinary medicine at Nottingham, and Molly Riggs is off to Plymouth to study dental surgery.

Head of Sixth Form Jamie Saunders said, 'This year group have been amazing to work with. They have faced so many challenges over the last few years but remained steadfast throughout and achieved their goals. They are a very diverse group of strong characters and it has been wonderful to see them support each other so well throughout their A-levels. Remarkably, they have also found the time to raise over £9000 for their three Sixth Form charities, through the Fashion Show and Charity Week. They know how to have a good time, too, and live life to the full, having thoroughly enjoyed and made the most of our social celebrations, such as the Winter and Summer Balls! 
The topics of the lectures were varied but all immensely interesting. Yee Mun Lee's talk on self-

driving cars offered a new, pedestrian perspective on the problems of automated vehicles, while James Arthur's lecture on the relationship between Computer Science and Mathematics fascinated us with their philosophical outlook on the existence of truth. Dr Miranda Mowbray then revealed how shockingly similar the election system of

13th century Venice was to algorithms used by machine learning software, a clear sign of how much we have to learn from the past. After a whistle-stop tour of Westminster's most iconic landmarks during our lunch break, we returned for some great exam top tips before continuing with the lectures. Professor Matthew Leeke engaged and slightly spooked us with his tales of how simple data from our smartphones can be used to fully map out our lives, inspiring us to be vigilant with our data. Finally Mark Jago's talk on Alan Turing perplexed us with Turing's early computation, and reminded us of just how far computer science has come in just 70 years. It was an excellent trip, and we all learned so much from it about

Students had a lecture delivered by top journalists from The Guardian newspaper, and Lucy McCormick illustrated to the students the technological advances that newspapers are making, in an effort to move more online. The Sixth Formers were shown a range of job opportunities within the industry and given details of future projects and ways to keep in touch.

Following this was Simon Bird - Actor (Inbetweeners, Friday Night Dinner), director, comedian (a firm favourite with the students!); Maitrayee Basu – University lecturer specialising in activism and afrofuturism; Alex Kayode-

Kay - Director of the BAFTA nominated short film The Ballad of Olive Morris; David Hesmondhalgh - Key A-Level theorist (Senior Lecturer in Media and Communications at Leeds University), and Anamik Saha – Leeds University Media lecturer, spoke mostly about the legacy of influential theorist and media sociologist, Stuart Hall.

Animal Antics at Marwell Zoo



In February Year 12 Psychology students visited Marwell Zoo for a conference that included the learning of and application of observational studies. This is an important research method on their exam board specification. They also re-visited their learning of classical and operant conditioning.

The students took part in a pilot study to

trial their observation procedure and then refined their method with the guidance of the conference leaders. They then carried out a comparative observational study of their two chosen animals and their behaviours. Analysis of data and presentation of their findings to each other and Marwell staff was next. Students were encouraged to evaluate their methods and many recognised that opting to compare their favourite animals wasn't a wise choice... it's hard to find useful behaviours to compare between a giraffe and a penguin! It was a great way to end the half term. Olivia Baggott, 12 Andrewes, gave her thoughts on the day:


"On our day at Marwell Zoo we had the opportunity to gain primary data by observing our chosen animals. We chose from all the animals available in the zoo and observed their behaviour and identified coding categories. In my investigation I observed the meerkats and ring-tailed lemurs. We looked for their similarities and differences in the way they interacted, moved, ate and presented. The findings from our observation found that lemurs were a lot more static and less alert than the energetic meerkats, who were always standing to attention. The trip altogether really helped to put into practice the observational sampling techniques we have studied: time and event sampling and recognise the limitations and strengths of these methods. It was also a very fun day out."

Luffa. Tarantino. Hitchcock.

Our Year 12 and 13 Film Studies students got a fantastic, additional insight into two of their set exam texts and their directors during an exclusive seminar at New Park Cinema. This year's film exam texts include Tarantino's *Pulp Fiction* and Hitchcock's *Vertigo* and students were given insights to the directors' lives, careers and seminal films through clips and extensive research. Reviews from the Film Studies classes are in:

Anna Gehr (12Otter) - "The lecture at New Park greatly developed my knowledge on The Auteur Theory. By walking through the films of Hitchcock and Tarantino I was able to notice certain patterns carried throughout their works, and learned of their particular techniques and aesthetics. I found it particularly interesting that Hitchcock made over fifty films while Tarantino has a small collection of nine, but they all carry their



signature and can both be considered auteurs - no matter how different their careers. This opportunity has prepared our film studies class nicely for our study of the theory next year. I have a new respect for these films and their filmmakers, the New Park talk has changed how I will approach our Auteur unit entirely."

James Hume (12Ridgeway) - "I really enjoyed attending the visit to the New Park Cinema as it gave an amazing insight into the world of Quentin Tarintino and how he made his films. It was also fascinating to discover more about the classic filmmaker, Alfred Hitchcock and films such as *Vertigo*, *Rear Window* and *The Birds*."



Grace Livings (12Otter) - "The Film Studies trip to New Park Cinema trip was really useful, as we got a deeper insight to the way Alfred Hitchcock and Quentin Tarantino direct and construct a few of their most famous movies. Clips were shown from various of each director's movies to give us a broader understanding of their filming traits and styles. The trip really gave me more context on the directors that I didn't know before."
