Lest We Forget

fter unpredictable cloudbursts, the weather just about held, and we were able to mark the Armistice on Friday 10th November. The whole School assembled on the field just before 11am for a traditional service of commemoration. We heard a mixture of readings and prayers from the Head and others, including Mr Bonney, our School Captains, Mrs Bradberry and members of our clergy team. As well as this, Freddie Lynas (12Otter), using a bugle from World War One, superbly played the Last Post and Reveille either side of a two-minute silence. Wreaths



were laid on behalf of the School, and by a member of the armed forces, who we were fortunate enough to have in attendance at our service. The weather held, but it rained during, and only during, the two-minute silence, which added to the poignancy of that moment of solemn reflection. The service ended with the blowing of whistles dating from the Great War. Behaviour was very good, and students showed that they appreciated the importance of this moment, when we pause and consider those people who made the ultimate sacrifice to protect our freedoms.

Bishop Luffa students remember the Holocaust

ecently two of our Year 13 History students, Harry Appleby and Tom Miller (both 13Ridgeway) had the chance to visit Auschwitz Extermination Camp in Poland. The Holocaust Educational Trust's 'Lessons from Auschwitz Programme' runs trips to this infamous site to help ensure that the memory of the horrific events that took place there are not forgotten. Below are their thoughts on the visit:

'I went to Auschwitz with the Lessons from Auschwitz project, and from this experience I saw what the camps were actually like as opposed to seeing them through a photo. The experience was eye-opening. It was a very important place to visit to realise what conditions the prisoners were put under and what they saw every day, which was incredibly moving. The size of the camp is something that no one can expect, and with the fact that these camps were built for one purpose, the Lessons from Auschwitz project is an experience that will stick with me for the rest of my life'. 'I recently visited Auschwitz Birkenau as part of a project through the Holocaust Educational Trust. The day at the death camps was a very emotional and interesting experience. I was able to have a tour of both camps and deepen my knowledge of the topic whilst learning about some of the individual stories of the people that were killed at the camps. I'm going to use the lessons I learnt on this trip to commemorate Holocaust Memorial Day in school on the 27th January and highlight the importance of learning about this tragic and horrific event and what it can teach us about the future'. Romola Garai visits Bishop Luffa School

ctor, director and International Rescue Committee ambassador Romola Garai has said it's 'more important than ever' to make refugees feel welcome after a visit to Bishop Luffa School. The star of BBC drama *Vigil* and upcoming film *One Life*, recently surprised students who have been supported by the IRC's Healing Classrooms programme. During the visit, Romola - whose grandfather was a refugee from Hungary - learned how the programme's training and resources have helped the teachers to create a nurturing environment where refugee and asylumseeking pupils can thrive.



As well as taking a tour of the classrooms, Romola also spoke to Head Teacher Austen Hindman and EAL (English as an Additional Language) Coordinator Susie Cooke about some initiatives at the school. These include an international club where different cultures are celebrated, as well as a buddy system for refugee children and a cooking club.

"The visit shone a light on the profound impact that trauma-informed training and inclusivity initiatives can have," Romola said, adding: "It highlighted that when given the right support, refugee students are able to truly enrich the wider school community."

Staff at Bishop Luffa initially signed up to take part in the Healing Classrooms programme after 21 children from Ukraine joined when war broke out in their home country last year. The school wanted to ensure staff were able to support the newly arrived children and their families as they integrated into life in the UK. Since then, 28 more students who are refugees have been enrolled at the school, some of whom Romola was able to speak with. Romola said: "I met some fantastic students who have come from Ukraine and were able to tell me incredible moving experiences," she said.



"All the young people I spoke to shared the effect of being with staff members who were able to listen to them, take time with them and understand how difficult it has been for them to integrate into a completely different school system in a different language.

"I think they feel very passionately at the support they have had from teachers in the school and it was a really incredible privilege for me to see that."



Speaking of Healing Classrooms, Head Teacher Austen said his staff initially had 'no idea' how to support the students who had moved to the UK. Austen added: "I have no idea what I would do if I had to leave my home today, travel hundreds of miles and then start a new life in a country where I don't speak the language.

"That has happened to the 38 children who currently attend our school. We had no idea how to support them, but fortunately we were put in touch with the IRC and were able to take part in training as part of the Healing Classrooms project. I would urge anyone who is working with children who have entered the

country as refugees to join the project, as it will enable you to move beyond good intentions and begin to make a difference."

Romola is also starring in upcoming film *One Life* which tells the story of Nicholas Winton who rescued 669 children from Nazi-occupied Czechoslovakia at the brink of World War II, in cinemas across the UK this January.

"I am constantly inspired by the resilience of young refugees," Romola said. "One Life tells the story of children brought to safety in the UK, having been rescued from the imminent Nazi invasion of Prague prior to the Second World War. In today's context, the theme of the film and making refugees feel welcome in the UK is more important than ever, and the IRC's Healing Classrooms programme aims to do just that."

News from Design Technology

uring Design and Technology lessons over the last term Years 7, 8 and 9 students have been combining practical and technological skills with creative thinking, to design and making products and systems that meet human needs. They have learnt to use current technologies and consider the impact of future technological developments. All students are encouraged to think creatively and intervene to improve the quality of life, solving problems as individuals and as members of a team.

Year 7 Textiles have been making ECO Creatures in their Textiles lessons this term. Year 7 Product Design students have been introduced to basic workshop H&S, taught how to use hand tools correctly, learning the theory of different material properties of Wood and Polymers, and introduced to Computer Aided Design (CAD) and Computer Aided Manufacture (CAM).


A sample of **Year 8 textiles** students are trailing a project using E-Textiles within their cushion covers by adding a nightlight.

Year 12 Product Design students have been working like a small architectural & design company, to design a new unique themed dog kennel that would blend into a busy household or work area in a practical way.

Alex Wilburn awarded Arkwright Scholarship

he Arkwright Engineering Scholarship is an engineering award given to engineering students within the United Kingdom and Channel Islands. The scholarships are awarded through rigorous selection to the highest-calibre students from all educational backgrounds to support them through their A Levels. Scholarships consist of an annual financial award to the Scholar and to their school, and a range of enrichment activities that increase a Scholar's understanding of their chosen field of engineering, such as mentoring and industry visits.

To be awarded an Arkwright Engineering Scholarship, student applicants must go through a three-stage selection process. The first stage is an extended online application form, where students have to describe a technical project they have done and explain how engineering is an interest in their lives. This online application must include a reference from a relevant teacher at the applicant's school. Stage two is a two-hour exam, where applicants must set out the practical design and manufacturing methods of their proposed solutions to two stated engineering problems. The final stage is an interview hosted at a university renowned for engineering.



I am pleased to announce that Alex Wilburn (12Otter) has been successful in being awarded an Arkwright Scholarship after successfully passing through the three-stage selection process. Alex has been a key driver behind our school's successful GreenPower team using his natural leadership traits and passion for engineering.
