## **Bishop Luffa falls silent for the Armistice**

t 11am the whole School fell silent for 2 minutes to mark the 11th hour of the 11th day of the 11th month.



Each year we come together as a School community to pause and reflect, and to mark Armistice Day, and this year was no different. At a few minutes before 11.00am the School met on the field for a formal service of commemoration, led by Mr Hindman. Readings were heard from our chaplain, Father Phillip Amey, still himself in the naval reserves, and from School Captains, Aaron and Matilda. Mr Bonney read the Kohima Epitaph.

The two minutes silence at 11.00am was bookended by Last Post and Reveille, superbly played by Freddie Lynas (assisted by Mrs Bowen-Melfi), on a bugle from the First World War. The sound of these notes cutting through the air gave us a solemn reminder of why we pause and reflect.

Wreathes were also laid on behalf of the School by Mr Bonney and the School Captains. A guard of honour made up of students who serve in unformed organisations (coordinated by Year 13 student, Zoe Smyth) helped complete the picture of formal commemoration). The service also included the release of 20 white doves by members of our International Team, as a symbol of hope for the future, as well as a poem for peace read by Veronika Zavarzina (Year 12).



We finished with Aaron blowing a whistle from the First

World War trenches. Along with the bugle, we had a tangible link to those who served in that terrible conflict, and heard sounds that echoed across the battlefields, a poignant way to help the School to mark this important moment of national commemoration.

The students behaved extremely well, and clearly understood why this moment of coming together really mattered. Edward Knott (13Ridgeway) did an amazing job of recording the event on his drone and has put together a <u>video of the event</u>.

My thanks must go to all of those who helped make the service run so smoothly, including Mrs Christopher, the Site Team, Mr Green and Mr Brown, Mrs Lopez-Gamero, Mrs Cooke and the International team, Father Phillip, Miss Sutton, Mr Hindman and Mrs Fowles (who linked us up with the team that provided the doves). # A Historic Splash: Bishop Luffa Swimming Team's Unprecedented Achievement

annah Day (12Ridgeway), Florence Ingram (12Ridgeway), Eloise Joubert (11Burrows) and Libby Johnson (11Sherborne) qualified out of their medley and freestyle to qualify for the English Schools National Finals, competing against school swimming heavyweights and Olympians.



On Saturday 16th November Bishop Luffa School competed at the English Schools Swimming Finals at Sandwell Aquatic Centre in Birmingham, where the 2022 Commonwealth Games were held, following qualification from the county round. It was the third time Bishop Luffa had qualified for this competition, but the first time we had ever qualified multiple teams. During the opening of the competition, team captains Alex Wilkes and Hannah Day were warmly introduced to the crowd of over 500 people, along with captains from all schools. The

National Anthem gave goose bumps for our

athletes in this incredibly proud moment for them and the school. Kick starting the event for Bishop Luffa was Max Stanton (8King), Alex Wilkes (8Burrows), Derin Cowley (8Story) and Curtis Jacobs (7Sherborne) competing in the junior medley relay. The team gave every ounce of effort and finished 18th out of 30 teams, with a team personal best by more than 0.6 of a second.

In our second event of the day the senior girls were preparing for their freestyle heat. We were hoping to qualify but were not highly confident in doing so, and we felt our success may come later in the day in the medley final. We finished 4th in our heat beating schools we did not think we would come near. With two more heats to go we were unsure if we had qualified. The suspense of the wait was tantalising and when the result came through that we had qualified, jubilant celebrations broke out. The girls' knew coming into this final that we were up against the nation's best swimmers, with much greater resources than we have. We finished 9th and history was made. This was the first team from Bishop Luffa to have made an English Schools National Swimming Final.

In the boys' second event of the day, Harry Peregrin (7Andrewes) came into the freestyle team, and in a tough lane draw, competed valiantly throughout the race finishing 19th between the three heats. The team swam a 4 second personal best, this was extraordinary to save so much time! Harry, Max, Alex, Derin and Curtis swam together for the first time at the Sussex qualifier in October 2024 and have trained together once, for one hour, in the build up to these finals. For these boys to get into the final is no mean feat and, in the future, we will certainly be hearing more about this team in their bid to qualify out of their heats.





For the senior girls' medley relay, we believed they had the chance to qualify but knew they had to all swim personal bests to have a chance of doing this. The girls swam a personal best by 0.3 seconds which allowed them to squeeze into the final inscribing their names into the Bishop Luffa history books, qualifying for a second national final. In the final the team were again underdogs but fought valiantly, Eloise showed determination through illness to give us a good start with her backstroke, Florence's elegant breaststroke kept us with the pack, Libby flew through their air with her butterfly leg before handing over to Hannah to come within half a second of 8th place as she hits the finish. Even at the teams sixth race of the

event the girls made a substantial personal best from their time in

the heat of 2.07.57 to their time in the final 2.06.82.

A big thank you to Chichester Chiropractic Health Centre (CCHC) who have supported and sponsored the team to train before the event for the first time and bought the team memento tops of the day. Both teams did incredibly well and we are very proud of everyone's achievements. Bishop Luffa student's do what Bishop Luffa students do and when the moment comes they stand up and are counted, but this time they are history makers.

## Making Lava Lamps

t STEM Club we investigated Alka-Seltzer Powered Lava Lamps and how long it took the tablet to disappear, how vigorous the bubbles were, and the differences in how the reaction happened in the colder liquid versus in the hotter liquid.

The ingredients in Alka-Seltzer combine with water to form a gas called carbon dioxide. The oil and Alka-Seltz er do not combine in this way though. The Alka-Seltzer tablets sink through the vegetable oil until they reach the layer of coloured water. There the Alka-Seltzer dissolves in the water and forms carbon dioxide. The gas is lighter than the water and oil, so it bubbles up, taking a bit of coloured water with it as it moves through the oil layer. You will see those bubbles, looking like colourful blobs, floating through the oil layer to the top of the jar. At the top the



bubbles should have burst (releasing the carbon dioxide gas), and then the colourful blobs sank back to the bottom (now without carbon dioxide gas). The effect was reminiscent of a lava lamp. Click on this <u>video</u> <u>link</u> to find out more.

The chemical reaction that causes the carbon dioxide to form happens more quickly in warmer water. For this reason, the Alka-Seltzer tablet dissolved more quickly in the hot water. This resulted in lots of rapid bubbling and an energetic lava lamp display. In contrast, the Alka-Seltzer tablet in the cold water dissolved more slowly, with most of it disappearing in the first two to three minutes, resulting in a calmer and longer lasting lava lamp effect!

## Year 8 get a glimpse into a Tudor World!

ver the course of the week commencing 18th November, all of Year 8 got the chance to visit the Mary Rose Museum in Portsmouth as part of their History studies. This visit slotted in perfectly to the work they are doing at present on Tudor England, and more specifically, the reign of Henry VIII.

As well as seeing the ship itself, students were able to study many of the artefacts 'up close', marvelling at the superb state of preservation of everything from combs and shoes, through to the remains of the ship's dog!



The students also got the chance to experience what is was like to dive down to the Mary Rose through the '4D' cinema experience, and undertook a workshop, where they either planned out Tudor military strategy and acted out the role of a Tudor gun crew, or got a gory insight into Tudor medicine.



This was a superb opportunity to visit a world-class museum right on our doorstep, bringing local (and national) history alive, and supporting our learning in the classroom. It also helped shed some light on the lives of ordinary people in Tudor times, something that helps to give a richer view of what the past was really like.

West Sussex Fire and Rescue Service joined us for the first time, bringing along equipment and uniform for the students to try out and midwives from NHS Portsmouth University Hospital encouraged students to try on a 7month fake pregnancy bump, with students commenting on how heavy and uncomfortable it was! Representatives from colleges and universities including Cardiff, Sussex, Bath and Sparsholt offered detailed information about courses, entry requirements and student life. Students across all year groups actively engaged with exhibitors, with exhibitors commenting on how polite they were and how insightful their questions.

One highlight was catching up with Freddie Laing, Zak Leahy and Sebastian Cunningham who were representing Rolls Royce. Having joined Rolls Royce after GCSEs at Bishop Luffa, they are months into their apprenticeships, having enjoyed team building, college lectures and time at the plant in their individual departments. They advised students about recruitment processes and progression within Rolls Royce and were all thoroughly enjoying their apprenticeships.

# **Computer Science Students inspired by Cutting-Edge Tech**

In November thirteen of our A Level Computer Science students had the privilege of attending the Computer Science in Action event at the Emmanuel Centre, London. This engaging and interactive day featured talks from leading academics and industry experts, offering students an exciting insight into the latest advancements in technology and computer science.

The event began with a thought-provoking session by Professor Matthew Leeke, exploring the evolution of computers and how foundational concepts taught in GCSE and A Level Computer Science underpin today's cutting-edge supercomputers. Dr. Emma Byrne then delved into the complex world of large language models (LLMs), examining how these powerful AI tools are built and the ethical challenges surrounding them.

The importance of good software design was highlighted by Paul Curzon, who shared fascinating examples of how thoughtful programming can prevent human error and save lives, particularly in healthcare. Students were also captivated by Amber Shand's inspiring talk about her unconventional path into the tech industry. With no formal computer science background, Amber learned to code and became an award-winning software engineer, proving that a successful career in tech is accessible to anyone willing to take the leap.



The day concluded with Dr. Kate Devlin's exploration of AI in our daily lives, sparking meaningful discussions about how AI affects

and relies on us, even when we don't interact with it directly. Students also enjoyed interactive polls, quizzes, and a special workshop designed to boost their exam success. 
