"My work experience at Birdham Primary School was thoroughly enjoyable. In the months anticipating it, there was a little frisson - 'Aren't I a bit immature to work? Won't the adults look down on me? How different will it be to school?' but when I got there all of that flew out the window. They took me seriously and kept me very busy. The kids were great fun too. It impacted me by making me consider becoming a teacher. It also taught me discipline, time management and showed me that work isn't as scary as I first thought. I'd highly recommend it to anybody who enjoys working with kids, but to nobody who likes order and control rather than chaos and mischief! I can't think of anything to improve Bishop Luffa work experience other than having less PHSE lessons building up to it. We have two but one is enough."

Year 12 visit Marwell Zoo

fter a week of torrential rain, we were lucky enough to have a dry day for our visit to Marwell Zoo. The staff at the zoo reported the lack of animal activity to study earlier in the week, but the animals were active and interesting for us. The students were fantastic and carried out some great studies. One Year 12 student provided the following report:



'On the Marwell trip I learnt a lot about the observational techniques that are part of our psychology

course. I bettered my understanding of conducting an observation through actually doing it. I learnt more about fully operationalizing behavioural categories to investigate natural behaviour and the importance of conducting pilot studies. As a group we worked together to not only collect the data, but to analyse, present and evaluate it as well, reflecting how research is carried out in psychology. I think this trip has helped me evaluate experiments in psychology and understand their strengths and limitations. I also really enjoyed learning about how psychological theory helps in how they keep their animals in the zoo. I found it really interesting in how they use operant and classical conditioning to train their tigers for vaccinations.'

Sporting News

ur students have had some amazing sporting achievements this half term:

Well done to Elsie Huxtable (7Ridgeway) who recently took part in the Sussex Long Course County Championships over various weekends this month and she did extremely well. Elsie raced 11 races and came away with 10 medals (4 golds, 5 silvers, 1 bronze) and 1 rosette (4th). She is Sussex Champion in her age group in four events. 50 breast, 50 free, 100 free and 200 Individual Medley.

Well done to Sam Machell (8Burrows) who over half term was in Palamos, Spain representing Great Britain in his dinghy sailing (The 34th International 2024 Vila de Palamos Optimist Trophy Regatta) doing five days of training, immediately followed by four days of racing, and was one of 550 participants from 24 countries. A total of nine races were held, five qualifying races and four Final Series races. The Race committee gave a total of 20 starts, two in each of the five groups, with a wind intensity between 9 and 12 knots. Sam qualified for the Bronze Fleet in the Final Series out of five fleets (Gold, Silver, Bronze, Emerald and Pearl).




At the beginning of March three Bishop Luffa students represented Bosham Sailing Club to compete in a fleet of over 160 boats at the Topper National Series held at the Weymouth and Portland National Sailing Academy, host of the sailing for the London 2012 Olympics. Charlie Mealing (10Otter), Matthew Board (10Andrewes) and Olaf Storton (9Ridgeway) sailed excellently in a big fleet and challenging conditions, with winds that varied over the two days from 5kts to 25kts! All three students performed well with Matthew

achieving top 10 finishes in the 5.3 Fleet and Olaf coming 5th overall in the 4.2 fleet. The spirit on and off the water was great and, while the competition was fierce, the atmosphere was supportive and engaging.

Huge congratulations to Ben Stewart (9Andrewes) who finished 19th out of 343 runners in the national

English Schools Cross Country Championships and was a part of the Sussex Junior Boys team who came 1st. Big congratulations again to Elodie Hill (9King) who also competed in the English Schools Cross Country Championships for Sussex and finished 100th out of 339 runners.

Hannah Day (11Ridgeway) recently competed at the Welsh National Swimming Championships. Despite being unwell Hannah came away with two bronze medals and a silver in the Women's 16 & 17 year age group events. She also achieved another qualifying time to cement her place on the Welsh National Squad for 2024/25. Well done Hannah.

Maths Feast 2024

n 12th March 2024, two teams of Year 10 mathematicians from Bishop Luffa competed against their opposite numbers from Chichester High School, Ormiston Six Villages Academy, and St. Philip Howard Catholic School in a series of problems ranging from quizzing, through logic puzzles and





crossnumber (the mathematical sibling of crossword), to construction of 3D models of cubes and even rhombic decahedra (3D shapes with 10 faces, each of which is a rhombus!) The competition spanned five rounds in total, and featured problems and exercises designed to show off lots of different areas of GCSE mathematics, as well as to provide some real-world context for where this maths might be useful in the future education and career paths of the students.

Beginning with a terrifically exciting TV quizzing round, students raced to find the missing number in a series of increasingly cryptic sequences, in the style of the game show Only Connect. This was followed by a tricky crossnumber puzzle. Similar in nature to a crossword, in that clues are required to fit together into a grid, but all of the clues were maths problems with numerical answers! Teams were divided into two parts for this task, and each half were tasked with filling one set of clues, either across or down, before coming back as a whole team to fit their answers together. Next, students were plunged into the world of logic — the mathematics of rules, decision making, and deduction — and tasked with analysing and inventing their own "worlds" in which people are only permitted to exist depending on the colour combinations among the hats that they wear! This was a two-step task: in the first round, students were given some rules and asked to deduce which combinations could be true and which must be false, and in the second half they had to create some of their own combinations from scratch. Finally, we moved into the mathematics of shape, for a task in which students were asked to create models of cubes and rhombic decahedra from cardboard and tape, and then calculate things such as the surface area and volume of their creations. Throughout the event there were numerous appearances of Pythagoras' theorem, trigonometry, number skills, algebra, and bunches more of the core skills that are so prevalent throughout GCSE mathematics.

Of course, when all is said and done, competitions have winners. I am beyond proud to announce that Bishop Luffa School and our students walked away with the following prizes:

- WINNERS of the TV quizzing challenge
- WINNERS of the crossnumber challenge
- HIGHLY COMMENDED in ALL rounds of the event

Huge congratulations are due to Jennifer Fitzgerald (10Story), Kathy Nightingale (10Burrows), Hayley Martin (10Wilson), Harry Kemp (10Sherborne), Austin Uphill (10King), Ned Coles (10Sherborne and Tom Vosper (10King) for their tremendous work ethic and application of mathematical knowledge across the whole event.

On Monday 11th March, Year 13 attended the PolEcon conference in London's Methodist Central Hall along with several thousand A Level politics students. A packed programme of high profile and significant speakers from across the political world each gave a short talk and (very bravely) took questions from the eager budding politicos.

Speakers of particular note included Wes Streeting (LAB), Sir Jacob Rees-Mogg (CON), Sarah Olney (LIB), Lord Dubs who spoke powerfully about the Dubs Amendments to the Rwanda Bill, and Richard Tice (REFORM). Each speaker gave a short account of what mattered to them, and shared their personal reflections on where things are heading, including the Rochdale By-Election, The Middle East and of course election prospects. Students were able to submit questions in advance, ask questions after each speaker and contributed to a survey, ahead of the election this year. In addition, Alastair Campbell and Rory Stewart, of The Rest is Politics podcast took an extended Q&A on a wide range of issues.

Overall a great occasion to draw the A Level course to a close, with enjoyable and thought-provoking speakers.



On Wednesday, we were also privileged to receive Ann Coffey, a Labour MP and Whip and then from 2019 Independent MP, for her reflections of a life in politics. As Tony Blair's PPS and Shadow Health Secretary and Labour whip, Ann's honest reflections and answers to questions gave some inspiration and food for thought about the reality of political life and leadership. We are very grateful for her refreshing perspective and passion for continued change to make our democracy as effective as possible. We were also joined by Portsmouth Grammar School, with whom we try to share opportunities like this.






forward to going back in May and to continuing building our relationship with them.
