
# Bishop Luffa School



ur students have had some amazing sporting achievements this half term:

Well done to Reuben Shewan (8Wilson), who qualified to represent Sussex at the English Schools Regional Combined Athletics Competition on 22nd June. Reuben came 4th out of 17th athletes.



Charlie Gran (12Burrows) has been having a fantastic summer so far. Charlie won overall Men's Silver medal and Bronze medal overall in this year's European Championships in Poland.

This was followed up by the equivalent of the Youth Olympics where his team finished up in the Silver medal position. They were very close to a Gold medal but just lost out in the last moments of the final race. It is an outstanding display of determination, mindset and

application. Charlie is now busy preparing for the Youth Sailing World Championships taking place in Aarhus, Denmark at the end of July.

This year's Sussex Athletics County Championships saw Amelia McGurk (13Ridgeway) collect two medals – her efforts in the U20 400m gained her a superb 2<sup>nd</sup> place Silver and a Gold in the U20/Senior 4 x 100m Relay. 
Team and earning the club a new PB of 4:02.06. They are currently ranked 31<sup>st</sup> in the UK behind International and top University teams.

We spent the first two days viewing many of the sites we study for Classical Civilisation A Level including the Theatre of Dionysus and the Theatre of Thorikos. We were also able to enjoy the astounding Temple of Poseidon at Cape Sounion, The Acropolis and its museum, taking in the sight of the birthplace of Western democracy at the Pnyx and the hill from which St Paul preached, as well as seeing the main sights in Athens.

Our last morning took us to Mycenae and the Lion Gate and ancient beehive tomb of Atreus. We returned sun-warmed, well fed, and vastly enriched by all the culture and beauty we had seen.

## Year 10 undertake Mock Interviews

they are briefed by colleagues from the Rotary Club and then have one to one interviews and personal feedback to help them in future interview situations.


# Computer Science Trip to Bletchley Park and National Museum of Computing

ur GCSE and A Level Computer Science students recently enjoyed a fascinating trip to Bletchley Park and the National Museum of Computing, delving into the rich history and evolution of computing.

### **Bletchley Park: Cracking the Lorenz Cipher**

At Bletchley Park, students attended a learning session on the Lorenz cipher, used by the German High Command during WWII. They learned about John Tiltman's breakthrough in deciphering Lorenz and engaged in tasks that illustrated the complexity of this cipher, focusing on binary operations and the XOR function. Key activities included:

- Understanding WWII ciphers and the challenges of breaking them.
- Exploring the vast settings of the Lorenz machine.
- Collaboratively solving problems based on historical events.



### **National Museum of Computing: Evolution of Technology**

The visit continued at the National Museum of Computing, where students participated in a guided tour showcasing the evolution of computing technology.

#### Highlights included:

- Viewing historic computers in operation, from WWII code-breaking machines to the first digital semi-programmable computer.
- Learning about the development of mainframes, supercomputers, and personal computers.
- Discovering the impact of modern microprocessors, mobile technology, and the internet.



This trip provided our students with a deeper understanding of the history of computing, inspiring them to appreciate the technological advancements that shape our world today.

This was very competitive and the students all took an active part in the workshop. A follow up homework back in class has been to design a rocket using the ideas from the workshop. Prizes were tickets to return to the Winchester Science Centre over the holidays.
